## Moore's Bridge site saved

On 13 February, the Trust for Public Land (<u>www.tpl.org</u>) and Carroll County announced that 485 acres along the Chattahoochee River have been permanently protected. TPL assembled the property, then sold it to Carroll County for \$4,474,000, which is below the appraised value.

The property is at the north end of the former covered wooden bridge built in 1858 by a free black man, Horace King. The land was supplied by James Moore, thus the name Moore's Bridge. King was a renowned bridge builder for almost 50 years in the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century.

In early July 1864, Federal cavalry under Major General George Stoneman was ordered to scout southwestward along the north bank of the Chattahoochee River. The objective was to convince the Confederates that the Federals were looking for a place to put the main infantry force across the river, as well as to cut the railroad and destroy supplies. On 13 July, Stoneman's troopers drove away the Confederates guarding Moore's bridge but hesitated instead of pushing on to Newnan. Early on 14 July, Armstrong's Confederate cavalry brigade attacked and drove away the Federals, who burned the bridge as they withdrew. The bridge abutments remain at the site. A thorough account of the action is in <u>Sherman's Horsemen</u>. Author David Evans will be joining us as we cover cavalry actions during our upcoming tour with Ed Bearss (see article).

Carroll County Parks & Recreation Department will manage the property. While a master plan for the site is still in the works, it is now saved thanks to Carroll County and TPL.
