After taking the town, Wilson established his headquarters in the Mott House, which still stands. GBA was approached to help restore six historical markers near the house and has pledged \$4,250 (25% of the cost).

Tracy plans to run 25-40 miles per day, retracing as much as possible the 100+ mile route taken by his collateral ancestor during the Atlanta Campaign in May 1864. ### 150 years ago this month

The Federal cavalry raid on Richmond fails on 1 March as Kilpatrick finds the city defenses too strong. Dahlgren and 500 men approach the city separately but also turn away. Dahlgren is killed the night of 2 March, and papers found on his body indicate assassination of Confederate President Davis and his cabinet was an objective of the raid. The papers lead to a testy correspondence between Lee and Meade and continuing uncertainty about who issued the orders.

On 1 March, Lincoln nominates Grant for the newly restored rank of lieutenant general, which the Senate confirms on the  $2^{nd}$ . Grant arrives in Washington on 8 March and receives his commission the next day. After visiting Meade, Grant decides he will make his headquarters in

the field in Virginia, then returns to Nashville. On 12 March, Grant is named general-in-chief of all U.S. armies, and Halleck is named chief of staff. On 18 March, Sherman assumes Grant's former command of Military Division of the Mississippi. Grant and Sherman travel together by train from Nashville on 19 March and over the next two days decide how the upcoming campaigns will proceed. On 24 March, Grant confers with Lincoln at the White House and by 26 March has established his headquarters at Culpeper Court House, Virginia. For his part, Sherman inspects his armies in Tennessee, northern Alabama, and northwest Georgia before meeting with his army commanders (Thomas, McPherson, Schofield) in Chattanooga on 28 March. Major troop movements are underway by mid month, with the 9<sup>th</sup> Corps leaving Knoxville for the eastern theater and the 4<sup>th</sup> Corps leaving Knoxville for southeastern Tennessee.

Johnston continues to repair the supply situation and rebuild the morale of the Confederate Army of Tennessee around Dalton, Georgia. The spirit of the troops is demonstrated on 22 March, when Walker's and Cheatham's divisions stage what is likely the largest snowball battle in history. On 1 March, Johnston welcomes Hood to command a corps. On 7 March, President Davis informs Johnston that he will be reinforced only if he takes the offensive. On the same day, Hood writes to Davis in response to Davis's request to be kept informed.

After conferring with Sherman in early March, Banks assembles army and navy units for a campaign up the Red River, in part to seize cotton. The first elements head upriver on 12 March. Sherman has provided Banks part of the Army of the Tennessee from Vicksburg, but Sherman expects to get it back before his campaign in Georgia begins in May. Banks' troops capture Alexandria, Louisiana on 16 March but don't advance from the city until the 28<sup>th</sup>.

Other command changes: On 10 March, Sigel assumes command of the Department of West Virginia, and on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, Lew Wallace assumes command of the Middle Department (eastern Maryland). On 16 March, Sterling Price takes command of Confederate forces in Arkansas.

On 3 March, Congress authorizes the U.S. Treasury to issue \$200 million in ten-year bonds. On 4 March, the Senate confirms Andrew Johnson as military governor of Tennessee. On 7 March, Lincoln designates the western border of Iowa as the starting point for the transcontinental railroad. On 14 March, Lincoln issues a draft order for 200,000 more men. On 21 March, Lincoln approves a Congressional act enabling Nevada and Colorado to become states.
