

Sections of Chattahoochee River Line added to National Register

On 8 June, the state Historic Preservation Division announced that two sections of the Chattahoochee River Line had been added to the National Register of Historic Places on 18 May. One section was part of the line constructed using slave labor beginning in mid June 1864 and occupied by the Confederates from the night of 4-5 July to the night of 9-10 July. The other section was part of the corresponding line built by Federal troops starting on 5 July. The two parcels were nominated separately. Both are owned by Cobb County.

These two parcels have been the subject of previous newsletter articles (e.g., September 2012 and August 2009). GBA helped prepare the Mableton Improvement Coalition application that resulted in a National Park Service grant to develop a preservation plan for the sites.

The River Line Historic Area <u>www.riverline.org</u> hopes the National Register designation will increase the chance of receiving park bond money previously approved by Cobb County voters. The money would be used to improve accessibility to both sites and to install directional signs and interpretive markers.

150 years ago this month – July 1865

On 7 July, four Lincoln assassination conspirators—Mary Surratt, Lewis Powell, David Herold, and George Atzerodt—are hanged at the Washington Arsenal (now Fort McNair).

On 13 July, Georgia Governor James Johnson issues a proclamation abolishing slavery and calling for an October election to choose delegates to a constitutional convention.

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
