New GIS web site for Cobb County

Many county governments in Georgia and other states have put property records online, usually using the Geographic Information System (GIS). The web sites are valuable for examining known or potentially historic properties, as the display typically includes both maps and photographs on which boundaries, zonings, and other features can be overlaid. For example, GBA has used the Cobb County online site many times over the years; and a new, easier to use version became available in mid January. Search for "Cobb County GIS" or type in http://www.cobbgis.org:81/Html5Viewer/?viewer=cobbpublic. The photos are sometimes clear enough to show earthworks.

Scouting preservation opportunities

Part of Georgia Battlefields Association's job is to examine properties reported to have historic value. Most often, these properties are brought to our attention by people who live near the sites. In some cases, people wonder whether a terrain feature may be a trench or earthwork, and an examination concludes instead that it is the remnant of a farm terrace or logging road. In other cases, the feature is almost certainly the remnant of an infantry trench or artillery revetment. Obviously, location and contemporary maps aid us in making a determination; but sometimes the established expertise of the person who brings a site to our attention leads us to assume a property contains earthworks before we see it. In every case, we scout the property before deciding whether to support an effort to preserve it.

Whitfield County likely contains as many earthwork remnants as any county in the nation. The Confederate Army of Tennessee spent over four months fortifying the area, and substantial fighting (as opposed to scouting and skirmishing) occurred both in late February and early May 1864. Further, the steep elevations have restricted development; and Dalton—the largest town in the county—has grown since the Civil War but not nearly as much as urban areas—such as Atlanta or Chattanooga or Petersburg, Virginia—near other battlefields.

Recently, GBA President Charlie Crawford and Vice President Mary-Elizabeth Ellard met with Whitfield County preservationist and historian Greg Cockburn to examine several sites north of Dalton. We hope to be able to provide more details about preservation opportunities soon.
